



Jackson can defy gravity. During a car accident he sustained a spinal cord injury when he was 16 and needed to use a wheelchair. He discovered the ReWalk robotic exoskeleton and worked with therapists at Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare to improve his strength and balance. He's 22 now and became the first person in Minnesota to be approved by an insurance company for a ReWalk for use at home and in his community.

Jackson finished his final training session in Sept. 2016 as a throng of family members, friends, and Gillette rehabilitation therapists joined Twins first baseman, Joe Mauer, in cheering him as he walked across the finish line.
